No Hazing!

- Founded in 1869 in direct opposition to hazing
- Only national fraternity founded against hazing
- Other key points of safety:
 - We DO NOT purchase or serve alcohol (since 1988). BYOB.
 - Hard alcohol (>15%) is not allowed at events or on property (2019).
 - We have a time-tested Risk Reduction Policy to reduce risks, educate members, and provide a safe social & living environment (1988).

Our Commitment to You & Your Son:

We, the advisors, the chapter officers, and membership, commit to you to the five objects of Sigma Nu:

- **1. HONOR**. To govern each act by a high sense of honor.
- 2. FRIENDSHIP. To bind together all members by ties of true and lasting friendship (brotherhood).
- 3. ASSISTANCE. To protect, assist, advance, and encourage each other by every honorable means.
- **4. UNITY**. To have plans for guidance and unity in action.
- 5. COMMUNICATION. To gather, to propose, discuss and agree upon these plans at meetings.

Further we commit to:

- 1. NO HAZING period! Sigma Nu was founded against hazing in 1869 that tradition continues.
- 2. **LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT** provide opportunities for the young men of our chapter to learn, develop, and practice their leadership skills that will serve them the rest of their lives.
- **3. EDUCATIONAL ASSET** we pledge that Sigma Nu will be an academic and educational asset to your son in college and after not the reverse. It will not be easy, but it will be rewarding.




Our Fraternity – The Legion of Honor



- Sigma Nu Fraternity
- Originally the "Legion of Honor"
- Founded January 1, 1869, at VMI
- Founded in opposition to hazing
- Founded on the Honor Principle
- Lexington hosts the VMI & W&L
- HQs is in Lexington since 1957



Our History












- Founders met on a limestone outcropping known as "The Rock"
- Origins as early as 1866, but organized in October 1868
- Public on January 1, 1869
- Opposed to hazing & servitude
- Founded on the Honor Principle with the defining principles of Love, Honor, & Truth
- North America's first "Honor Fraternity"
- ATΩ & KA Order were founded in Lexington

The Candidate Period

- Student first!
- 8 Week Program
- No hazing No alcohol No shenanigans
- Designed to educate candidates to be good members & citizens
- Program is developed by chapter, reviewed, and approve by AAB, FSL, and our National HQs. It is filled with content developed by Sigma Nu HQs.
- Violations or issues are investigated by GSU's Student Conduct and/or our National HQs.
- Positive points system. Initiation is:





Requirements for Sigma Nu

- Complete the Candidate Program.
- Attend required training & LEAD sessions.
- Complete community.edu (National on-line program).
- Be current in dues. Pay your initiation fee. Pay on time.
- Maintain academic standards: Goal is 3.0 or better. Minimum is 2.75.
- Minimum number of points.
- Positive points system. Initiation is:
- Be a gentleman DON'T be that guy DON'T be a jackass





LEAD: Candidate Education & Member Development



LEAD is Sigma Nu's award-winning ethical leadership development program. In alignment with Sigma Nu's continuing efforts "To develop ethical leaders..." we offer the LEAD Program as a tool to assist our membership in both gaining the knowledge and developing the skills and abilities needed to be an effective and ethical leader for life.

The LEAD Program is a comprehensive ethical leadership development program designed to ensure participants "learn by doing." LEAD is tied to the 4 years of college with 4 phases and becomes the basis, along with other experiences, in the Sigma Nu co-curricular transcript. Phase 1 is candidate education – the remaining phases are member development and life after college.

The Positive Impact of Sigma Nu

RESEARCH SHOWS THE VALUE OF MEMBERSHIP

Over the past four years, from the team at Gallup — the leader in research and analysis — to university faculty members, researchers have worked with the North American Interfraternity Conference (NIC), in partnership with the Foundation for Fraternal Excellence (FFE), to conduct and widely share the results of more than 20 studies to guide advocacy efforts and the work of fraternities.

STUDIES SHOW:

Fraternities are an accelerator for success in college and beyond.

Fraternities capitalize on students' time outside of the classroom by preparing men for success in college and in their futures far beyond what their peers experience. Because of higher expectations and the support and network fraternities provide, members experience greater gains in learning and graduate at higher rates than their peers. 83% of members say their confidence in their leadership skills increased because of their membership.

FRATERNITY MEN ARE...

- 3x more likely to obtain an internship while in college
- Almost 2x as likely to have a job waiting for them when they graduate
- ▶ 2x as likely to encourage others to attend their alma
- ▶ 5x as likely to give back financially to their alma mater
- ► Almost 5x as likely to be satisfied with their lives as alums
- More likely to intervene when a friend/peer is behaving in an unsafe manner

Fraternity men are socially conscious and believe in promoting safety and inclusion.

Considering high-risk behaviors, including sex, alcohol, and hazing, fraternity men believe in and promote safer and more inclusive environments than nonmembers. They understand the definition of sexual assault, report drinking less and with moderation, and choose not to participate in hazing because they do not want to cause emotional harm, it goes against their values, and wanting to be respected by others.

Fraternities create lifelong connections to the campus, community, and friends.

Fraternities empower students to create a strong support system. Members are more engaged inside and outside of the classroom than their peers — they report feeling more supported by their faculty, and nearly half serve in leadership roles across campus. They're also more connected to their local communities, with research showing they spend significantly more time volunteering than non-affiliated students.

Fraternity members experience stronger mental health.

Research shows fraternity membership connects men to the university in a way nonmembers simply don't experience. They're more satisfied as students and alumni and are more likely to recommend and give back to their alma maters. Research shows that this connection can create a strong sense of belonging, leading members to have more positive mental health and less anxiety and depression than other students.

Fraternity members hold their peers accountable.

Research shows that fraternity men are more likely to intervene in higher-risk situations than those not affiliated and that they are more comfortable in providing accountability in the areas of academics, sexual relationships, professional/career goals, personal goals, and hazing. Additionally, they cite a greater responsibility to support the personal and professional growth of their friends/peers — a proof point that affirms the meaning of true brotherhood. **



Sigma Nu (GSU) Dues – Where do they go?



- House Expenses 28%:
 - Parlor Fees to House Corp.
 - Utilities, Internet, etc.
 - Cleaning & Supplies
- Operations Expenses 17%:
 - Committee expense (not Social)
 - Candidate & Brotherhood Expenses
- Social Expenses 27%:
 - Parties, bands, & security
 - Tailgates, Game day, & major events
- Sigma Nu (HQs) Expenses 13%:
 - Candidate & Initiation Fees
 - Brother's Dues to HQs
 - Educational Programming
 - Conclave savings
- RMA Expenses 14%
- Savings: 5% 10% set aside
- Expenses: Fixed 37%; Variable: 63%



Sigma Nu (GSU) Dues – How Much Are they?

Sigma Nu Dues - What Members Pay

- Our dues are: \$1,100/semester; \$250/summer
 - Summer: \$850 (~65%)
 - Early Fall: \$500 (~35%)
 - Spring: \$1,100
 - Candidate: \$1,000 (\$125 to SNHQs included)
- Expectations:
 - o Paid on time
 - Payment plans available, if approved
 - Dues account online available to parents
 - Managed w/Greek Capital Management
- Subject to change based on budget
- We have a treasurer, assistant treasurer, finance committee, and 2 finance advisors

Sigma Nu Fees - Paid by Chapter from Dues

- Sigma Nu Fees paid out:
 - Candidate Fee: \$125 (one time, life)
 - Initiation Fee: \$250 (one time, life)
 - Initiate Dues: \$90/brother/semester
 - Conclave savings: \$1,500/chapter/semester
 - o RMA: \$157.50/semester/member
- House Fees & Expenses:
 - Parlor Fee: \$100/semester/member
 - Room Rent per Semester (residents only):
 - \$2,000/single occupancy/semester
 - \$1,200/double occupancy/semester
 - Utilities paid by chapter & occupants
 - House is open during summer based on needs



Sigma Nu (GSU) Dues – When are they due?

Sigma Nu Dues - What Candidates Pay

- \$1,000 for the Candidate Period
- Pay up front or in installments (if approved)
- Typical Candidate Payment Plan
 - \$250 by September 1
 - \$125 paid online to SNHQ Candidate Fee
 - \$125 paid to chapter by check or online
 - \$250 by September 20 to chapter*
 - \$250 by October 11 to chapter*
 - \$250 by October 25 to chapter*
 - *Due paid before initiation requirement
 - \$250 goes to SNHQ for Initiation Fee
 - The initiation fee is paid from dues

Candidate & Member Dues Expectations

- Paid on time teaching good financial habits
- Payment plans available, if approved
- Dues account online available to parents
- Managed w/Greek Capital Management
- 30-60-90 Day Policy
- Other fees & policies:
 - Chapter reviews and approves budget each term.
 - Most, if not all, fees from IFC, GSU, & Sigma Nu are paid from dues by the chapter.
 - Occasionally there is a supplemental fee for a formal, beach trip, or other trips.




